## Divesting to grow

Sale of PSB units = more jobs, capabilities for S'pore

I REFER to the letter by Ms Eunice Tan "Was key asset sold off?" (April 7). Spring Singapore appreciates this opportunity to clarify the points raised.

The "Yellow Pages" rule is for the Government to divest non-core functions and services which can be competitively provided by the private sector.

This is the case for testing, management systems certification and consulting services, which are provided in Singapore today by several local and foreign players – in addition to PSB Corp and PSB Cert.

These include ALS Technichem (S) Pte Ltd, Singapore Test Services Pte Ltd and Setsco Services Pte Ltd for testing; and BSI Management Systems (Asean) Pte Ltd, Lloyd's Register Quality Assurance Limited and SGS International Certification Services Singapore Pte Ltd for management systems certification.

There is, therefore, little reason for the Government to continue owning and operating PSB Corp and PSB Cert when there is already a competitive market in Singapore.

This is not the case with the National Metrology Infrastructure which remains a Government function in Spring as it provides the national primary measurements standards for Singapore and links measurements made in our industries to international standards. However, lower-level or secondary-level metrology services are already competitively provided by the private sector.

The divestment of PSB Corp and PSB Cert was conducted through an open and competitive sale process where many local and foreign players had bid.

The final sale price reflects the valuation ascribed by German conglomerate TUV SUD, who has indicated that the businesses are a good strategic fit with their global expansion plans.

The divestment took into account the buyer's plans to grow the business in Singapore and internationally, their commitment to Singapore and the continuity of the business.

TUV SUD has announced its intentions to make Singapore its regional headquarters and regional competency centre.

In addition, the conglomerate will invest a further \$70m to train staff, start know-how transfer programmes and enhance management skills and technologies over the next six years.

For Singapore, this means new capabilities and resources, knowledge transfer and more jobs. It will strengthen the testing and certification industry to support new areas, thus deepening Singapore's manufacturing capabilities. Leveraging on TUV SUD's established international network of capabilities and technical competencies will enable PSB Corp and PSB Cert to grow their capabilities and business even faster, and beyond the region.

Ultimately, both the companies and Singapore will stand to benefit. We now live in a global economy. Singapore needs to keep itself competitive and attractive as a place for investment and business if we are to attract, retain and grow enterprises and industries here, irrespective of whether they are locally or foreign-owned.
